


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Conversational Italian For Travelers: Just The Important Phrases (with Restaurant Vocabulary And Idiomatic Expressions)

Everyone learns differently, but for me I need total immersion and that means living among the Italians. However, with each new experience conversing with them while I'm in Italy, I learn a little more. They are so encouraging with my efforts to communicate and they make me feel good for putting my best efforts into it. It is such a rewarding experience to say the right words in Italian and to join in the conversation while making good sense. I always make it a rule to travel extremely light. That means just one small pull-bag and a knapsack. As most of us, I had to learn the hard way. So when Dr. Kathryn Occhipinti, author of "Conversational Italian for Travelers ~ Just the Important Phrases" approached me with her lightweight pocketbook, I was eager to look it over. I've had the book now for a few months and honestly, I am very impressed. Would I choose this particular pocketbook over any other similar one? Yes, absolutely. I've compared it to Rick Steves' "Italian Phrase Book and Dictionary," one I've used and loved, but Kathryn's is my favorite for a few reasons. It is nearly one-fourth the thickness which makes it much more pliable and lightweight. The basic phrases are all covered which includes everything from transportation, city life, hotels and restaurants. A few pages are dedicated to explaining the Italian alphabet, sound combinations and general pronunciation for speaking the words. A vocabulary is included at the end of each chapter. On the back of the pocketbook is a colorful regional map of Italy that I love. For the pure essentials to function adequately within an Italian community, with the addition of the pocketbook's slim dimensions, "Conversational Italian for Travelers-Just the Important Phrases" is my top choice. Occasionally I like to introduce an author or feature a book about Italy or anything Italian. Today I am honored to recommend a book I recently discovered, and I think you'll like it too.

Conversational Italian for Travelers Just the Important Phrases by Kathryn Occhipinti is the perfect travel companion for your trip to Italy. Concise and well organized, only 4 inches by 6 inches, this pocket-sized Italian language book can travel with you wherever you go in Italy. Beginning with pronunciation of the Italian alphabet this book is full of practical information about every aspect of travel in Italy.

Conversational Italian is what you need in Italy and you can learn it so quickly here with the author's focus on "just the important phrases." It's lightweight, but it's jam-packed with everything you need. Lightweight Before we even open a book, we consider its weight. We travel with just hand luggage only, so it's extremely important to us that books don't take up too much space. With **Conversational Italian for Travelers**, there is no problem, the book is so lightweight and thin! This was the first thing we loved about it. Jam-packed The downside of having a thin book, is that you often don't get all the essential information. But **Conversational Italian for Travelers** has managed to win that battle! It's just under 100 pages long, and each page is filled with important information, laid out in an easy to read way. From experience, talking about food is the most important thing to know in Italian. And this book contains 13 whole pages dedicated to food. (Note, side effects may include being hungry): We particularly love that the Italian is in blue and the English is in black - it makes for very easy reading.

family that loves to travel and I have spent many happy hours exploring Italy and getting to know my Italian "relatives" and their language and culture. Travelling to a foreign country can be a terrible experience if you don't know how to communicate. Kathryn thus solved this potential problem for all foreign visitors to Italy with her book picking on just the important phrases. To start with, the book is both exciting and humorous. The reader discovers the Italian alphabet has 21 letters and borrows some additions from Latin. There are surprising differences from English, like z becomes zeta and is pronounced zeh-tah. I spent some time translating my name and found the result amusing. Learning to pronounce the words correctly was an enjoyable experiment in which I found myself closer and closer to sounding very foreign and learned. I discovered "buongiorno" is all I need to say from morning to early evening, and if I am not yet in my hotel then "buonasera" will do until bedtime. For hi and bye to friends there is just one word to learn "ciao", but there are so many ways to say goodbye you really have to take your time to learn them. "Millie Gracie" means thanks a lot (a thousand) though I expected it to be "thanks a million". The writer takes the reader through the basic everyday conversational Italian in an interesting manner. You learn to be polite and formal and at the same time to be friendly and appreciative of any assistance. You also learn how to form important phrases, how to ask for the important things and making friends. The book teaches you to get comfortable at the hotel, at a restaurant and when sightseeing. It is indeed a comprehensive guide I would recommend to anyone travelling to Italy who does not speak Italian. As for me if someone says "Parla italiano?" (Do you speak Italian?), I will just say "Si, un po" (Yes, a little) even though sono di Zimbabwe (I am from Zimbabwe). Si, I loved this book.

Well organized. Easy to understand. Told in an interesting way. Freed from the burden of memorizing rules, we start with pronunciation and learn the important expressions for traveling, sightseeing, and shopping. Tips involve polite or informal usage. That may seem hard to digest, but to the reader's relief familiar words and phrases from movies, books, and songs, give comforting moments of aha. And if you have some knowledge of other Romance languages, it's interesting to see the similarities. We also find words Italians adopted from English or English speakers adopted from Italian. In the last two sections of the booklet the author shows us why we may want to visit Italy, to find friendship, romance, or great dining. I had to smile over useful sentences, such as "Can I buy you a drink?" to "Take a hike." My smile broadened where the author left us with a great list of foods, some of them familiar, such as spaghetti, tortellini, ragu, calamari... With that, your appetite is awakened, and Italy beckons. Minor confusion calls for clarification on some of the reflexive verb and pronoun usage. Otherwise, here is a handy booklet of important expressions you can carry in your pocket.

Prior to our trip to Italy my wife and I wanted to learn some basic Italian words and phrases. We knew this would be challenging because neither one of us could speak or read any Italian. The topics covered in *Just the Important Phrases* helped us learn how to greet people, shop in local shops and farmer's markets, speak with waiters and even order train tickets. My wife and I recently returned from a very enjoyable trip to Italy! We highly recommend Kathryn Occhipinti's *Conversational Italian for Travelers* resources!

I love Italy: the wonderful and free flowing food, loud and welcoming people, gelato and Limoncello, the colors and brightness of everything and I wish I had this book to read when I went there last. This is a handy guide for a short stay in the country and perhaps even for the student or professional on a study/ work break. The phrase book is segregated into nifty sections: basics, transportation, city life, at the hotel, restaurant just the most important phrases to navigate through them. One wonders though at how useful this can be to carry around, and I believe a brief of top 50 commonly used phrases at the beginning of the book might have been useful. A dictionary at the end with 500 or so most used words also would have been helpful. The problem with phrase book is that you can either memorize the book (quite impossible) or carry them around for ready reference. But you cannot really be standing waiting to buy a ticket and frantically navigate through a book. Still, I think this book is useful and given it is inexpensive, is worth a buy if you're travelling to Italy. It delivers what it promises. Note: I received a free copy of this book in exchange
