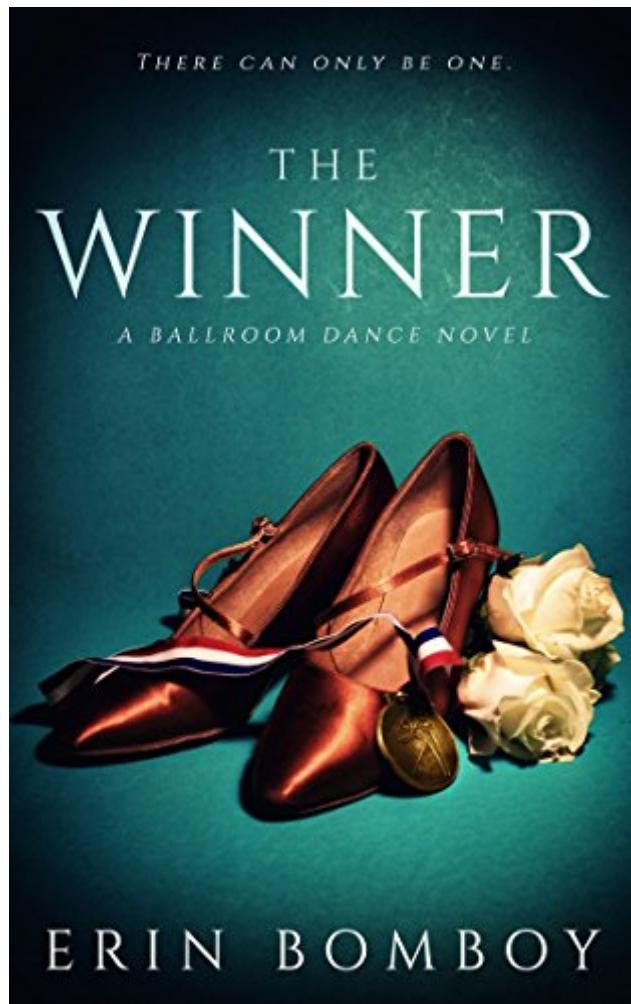


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The Winner: A Ballroom Dance Novel



Synopsis

Ballroom Dance fan or not, this is a great read. Comedic in parts, it was also filled with the pathos and complexity of real life. Even though my dancing experience is almost nil, I enjoyed and easily followed the adventures of the two main characters: one woman just entering the dance world, and the other a veteran of that world. The author brought the NYC setting to impressive life, including its ethnic roots. Love in many forms - whether it involved parents and children, romantic lovers and friends, rivals and competitors - were explored in exquisite detail. The author has a way of making you feel the characters' pain, joy and dilemma - just like real life except this happens on the dance floor. The *Winner* is a winner! Engaging, exciting, and easy to read! This book is a page turner, whether or not you know (or care) anything about ballroom dance. Although the book is quite lengthy, it moves quickly. The short chapters and alternating character views give it a driving pace. I soon found myself absorbed into an alternative world of dramatic dancing, fierce competition, and sometimes sinister relationships.

The characters are fully realized and seem to be people you'd actually meet about town. While the tale grows dark with depressingly real circumstance it remains at its core an enjoyable read.

Before I began reading *The Winner*, my knowledge about ballroom dancing was very limited. I had no idea that this particular dance was still very popular or that there were plenty of competitions where people could compete professionally. The couples I always saw swirling gracefully across the dance floor in the movies always gave me the impression that ballroom dancing was an easy thing to do and could be achieved without much practice. Of course this book proved to me how wrong I was as I read page after page about all those hours of practice and hard work that were necessary in order for someone to dance gracefully and I learned about all the sacrifices someone had to do in order to just be able to participate in a professional competition. *Ballroom dancing was inherently social, but steps replaced words and beats ironed out pauses. The shy, the awkward, and the weird found a home where good rhythm or a barn of a memory vanquished their shyness, awkwardness, and weirdness.* The story is told by two point of views, Carly is a young dancer who has just entered the world of ballroom dancing and her life is full of endless possibilities, on the other hand Nina has been a dancer for a very long time and as her body slowly begins to fail her, it becomes quite obvious that she won't have many chances as a professional competitor. The two heroines due to various circumstances end up in desperate need to win the same competition in order to achieve their dreams. This book might be 350+ pages but I have to say I didn't notice its length at all, the story flowed very nicely and the alternations between points of view were done at the right time to keep things interesting and the pace fast. Not once did I feel bored reading about the struggles each heroine had to face, it was so intriguing to witness the changes in Carly's and Nina's character who not only have to face the

physical and mental impact their harsh training has in them but they also have to navigate their relationship with their dancing partners with whom they become more and more romantically involved, the longer they keep dancing. I witnessed so many life changing events happening as the fervor each heroine had for the winning position consumed her, that by the end of the book their transformation was so tremendous that I felt as if I didn't see just a small glimpse of their time but their entire life.
