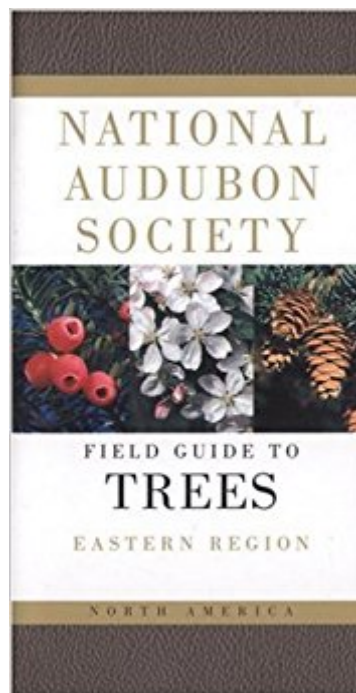




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Audubon Society Field Guide To North American Trees: Eastern Region

For the untrained observer, it can be quite a challenge to sort out the many trees that make up a stand of older forest in, say, New England or the Ozarks. This well-illustrated guidebook, covering 364 species, comes to the rescue with photographs organized in several ways: by, for example, the shape of the leaf or needle, by the fruit, by the flower or cone, and by autumn coloration. Following one visible characteristic or another, the reader can narrow the range of possibilities, then turn to an informative text that describes a tree's physical characteristics, habitat, and range. Many of the species covered are relatively rare, such as the "stinking cedar" of the Georgia-Florida border; others are locally abundant, such as the paper birch of the boreal forest, used to make ice-cream sticks; still others, such as the smooth sumac, are widespread. The guidebook also covers ornamentals introduced from other continents, such as the Chinese privet and Mahaleb cherry.

Whenever I feel nostalgic for the New England hills where I grew up, I sit with this little book for a while. Browsing its pages never fails to bring back the days when life was so simple that a walk in the forest was all you needed to feel like the world was a beautiful place. This handy-sized guide has a wealth of full-color illustrations that are organized in a user-friendly way. If it provided better illustrations of tree bark and branch structure (for winter identification) I would have given it five stars. Also, the plastic covers make it practical for outdoor use but the edges are sharp and can do with a trim of duct tape. Well worth the price - all the Audubon books in this series are useful and they hold up well over time and use. Besides collecting them myself, I give them as gifts to nature-loving family & friends.

My favorite part about this guide is the photographs of each tree species, as well as the illustrations and descriptions that go along with them. There is just a wealth of images and information to find here in such a compact book. I can go to this guide for reference and verification and it generally points me in the right direction. I take it with me every time I go out into the field now.

For decades these have been so beautifully done, informative and concise. Finding what you want

is easy because each volume includes several ways to look things up. A great addition to our usual online resources. The plastic cover is worthwhile protection from the damp and mud outdoors, and from general wear. Other volumes in this series are just as beautiful and useful.
