


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An American In Tunis: My Time In The Land Of The Carthaginians



Synopsis

Tunisia is a tiny country that lies on the Mediterranean coast in North Africa. Throughout the centuries it was known for Carthage, Hannibal and being the home of Saint Augustine. A major route leading slaves and goods from sub-Saharan Africa to Rome, Tunisia also became an important Roman colony. Travel to the International Festival of Douz to experience southern culture, landscape and hospitality. Visit impressive Roman antiquity sites like the town of Oudna and the catacombs of Sousse. Experience the island town of Djerba, where the largest Jewish community lies in the country. Take a look inside Tunisian families and how they celebrate their holidays and every day life. Through a rather humorous and sometimes sarcastic tone, Williams-Mejri explores how the culture is evolving as the population struggles to find a new identity. She makes no effort to gloss over current troubles in Tunisia. Rather, she gives the reader the realization that humanity is the same wherever one is in the world, and that there is always hope for a people or country regardless of the current situation. The author offers the reader the ability to look past the media hype and into the hearts and minds of a people so similar and yet so different to the rest of the world.
