

Students learn to analyze a wide variety of visual and graphic stimuli such as paintings, photographs, charts, and graphs using Document-Based Questions. Containing sixteen different themes selected from major units that are covered in American History, DBQs help to utilize many of the skills stressed by social studies teachers, and are an excellent tool for assessing student progress. The activities are geared primarily toward middle school students (grades 6-8), but can be adapted easily for use by secondary students.

This book has great hints as to how one should go about teaching the writing of a DBQ. It is geared to Middle School and any parent who is frustrated about helping a student with his/her work should give this a try. This type of writing is rather new and sometimes a bit of education for the adults helps.

I teach 8th grade gifted students and the types of questions that go along with the documents are way too easy for my students. I had to create supplemental questions to raise their level of thinking and inquiry. The documents used are also pretty basic and do not require much analysis. I think these would fit more for a teacher who teaches 6th grade American History.

I ordered this book thinking it was a guide for how to teach primary source analysis so that students can master document-based question essays.
