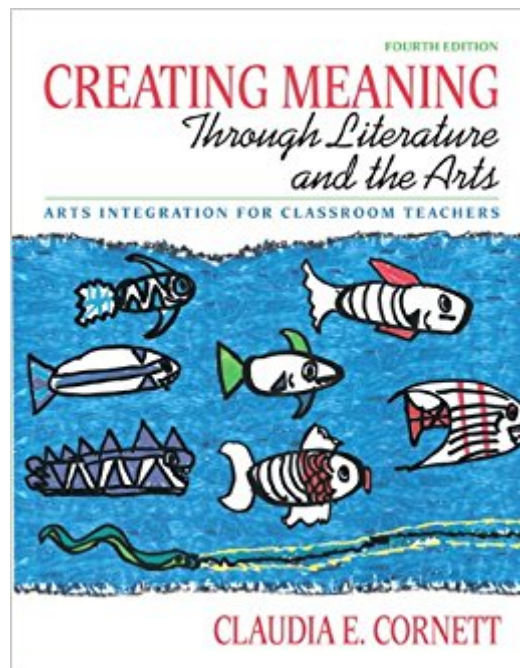




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Creating Meaning Through Literature And The Arts: Arts Integration For Classroom Teachers (4th Edition)

Her most recent publications include *Comprehension First: Inquiry into Big Ideas using Important Questions* in press. In 2006 the International Reading Association published her article, *Center Stage: Arts-Based Read Alouds* in the November *Reading Teacher*. In 2002 Phi Delta Kappa published a second edition of *Learning through Laughter*. Claudia regularly participates in keynote addresses and professional development for educators throughout the United States, Europe, and Canada. Her current research focuses on redefining literacy to include all the communication arts, including the fine and performing arts.
