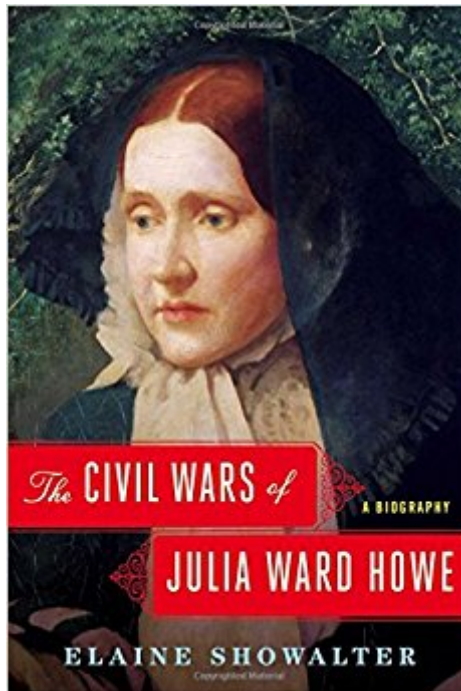

The Civil Wars Of Julia Ward Howe: A Biography

Julia Ward (1819–1910) was a heiress and aspiring poet when she married Dr. Samuel Gridley Howe, an internationally-acclaimed pioneer in the education of the blind. Together the Howes knew many of the key figures of their era, from Charles Dickens to John Brown. But he also wasted her inheritance, isolated and discouraged her, and opposed her literary ambitions. Julia persisted, and continued to publish poems and plays while raising six children. Authorship of the Battle Hymn of the Republic made her celebrated and revered. But Julia was also continuing to fight a civil war at home; she became a pacifist, suffragist, and world traveler. She came into her own as a tireless campaigner for women’s rights and social reform. Esteemed author Elaine Showalter tells the story of Howe’s determined self-creation and brings to life the society she inhabited and the obstacles she overcame.

Elaine Showalter, Emeritus Professor of English at Princeton University, combines scholarly expertise in English and American literature with a passion for a wide range of cultural subjects. She has written ten books, most recently *The Civil Wars of Julia Ward Howe: A Biography* and *A Jury of Her Peers: American Women Writers from Anne Bradstreet to Annie Proulx*, which was awarded the Truman Capote Prize for Literary Criticism. Her writing has appeared in the *Times Literary Supplement*, *People*, and *Vogue*.

This was an interesting, well-written book. The scholarship showed. I expect that some will raise issues about Showalter's emphasis on Julia's relationships with both her father and husband. To be charitable, she was "a product of her times." Her father did an outstanding job of bringing in outstanding teachers for his daughters, while his sons were sent to boarding schools. In fact, Showalter makes the point that the daughters probably had better educations by staying at home. However, one is led to question whether this was to help them in the marital sweepstakes. The missing star is for the missing part of the book. When JWH's husband dies, Showalter pretty much finishes writing and researching. Given the fact that JWH was widowed for one year longer than she was married, roughly 1/3 of her life is pretty much neglected. As a minister, I used this book as the basis for my Mother's Day sermon. JWH wrote a splendid "Mother's Day Proclamation for Peace." Showalter devoted half a page to this. So, the missing star is for the unwritten part of the book that I had to search for elsewhere.

"The Civil Wars of Julia Ward Howe" is both a biography of the poet and an overview of what life was like for upper-middle class American women during the 19th century. Born in 1819 to the scion of an old colonial family, Julia's world shrank as her widowed father's increasingly Calvinistic outlook cut Howe and her sisters off from society. Marriage to a pioneering Boston doctor, whose views on motherhood clashed with her own desire to work and write, led to a life of not-so-quiet desperation; she published books without telling him, while he drained her inheritance. They found some common ground in their passion for the abolitionist movement -- which led to her writing the Battle Hymn of the Republic -- but drifted apart until he died after the Civil War. Finally free to pursue her interests, she blossomed, living on for 35 years and working as a reformer, writer, lecturer, and traveler. Showalter uses family papers and letters between the Howes, their six children, Julia's siblings, and their famous friends (Longfellow, Henry James, Charles Sumner, etc.) to delve into their private lives and motivations. It makes for fascinating reading, as she reveals Julia's frustration with being tied to the conventional domestic life of a workaholic Boston physician. Correspondence during their periodic separations, such as times she spent in Europe, show a woman coming into her own and finally building her own legacy. Although the book reflects excellent scholarly research, it is an engaging read. For a relatively short book, it covers nearly a century of American social history and the long life of Julia Ward Howe.

This is an outstanding biography of Julia Ward Howe. I had just finished reading a book on Abraham

Lincoln. It was just after he realized that there could be slavery in this country. He asked Julia Ward Howe to write a poem for the North that could be song to the tune of John Brown's Body.
