


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Follies Of God: Tennessee Williams And The Women Of The Fog



Synopsis

This remarkably illuminating portrait of Tennessee Williams lifts the veil on the heart and soul of his artistic inspiration: the unspoken collaboration between playwright and actor. At a low moment in Williams' life, he summoned to New Orleans a young twenty-year-old writer, James Grissom, who had written him a letter asking for advice. After a long, intense conversation, Williams sent Grissom on a journey on his behalf to find out if he or his work had mattered to those who had so deeply mattered to him. Among the more than seventy women and men with whom Grissom talked were giants of American theater and film: Lillian Gish, ("the escort who brought me to Blanche"), Jessica Tandy (the original Blanche DuBois on Broadway), Eva Le Gallienne ("She was a stone against which I could rub my talent and feel that it became sharper"), Maureen Stapleton, Julie Harris, Bette Davis, Katherine Hepburn, Elia Kazan, Marlon Brando, John Gielgud, and many more. *Follies of God* provides dazzling insight into how Williams conjured the dramatic characters and plays that so transformed American theater.

James Grissom took a huge chance by sharing so much of his research work on Facebook during the many years he spent putting together *Follies of God*, the fantastic new book about Tennessee Williams and the actresses who inspired the playwright. Grissom’s social network page has been full of wonderful excerpts from interviews he’s done over the past four decades, generating a tremendous amount of buzz within the theatrical community, but also risking a feeling of *deja vu* when we finally got our hands on the book itself. Well, *Follies of God* lives up to all of the anticipation Grissom has generated. The notes and thoughts he shared on Facebook over the past few years in no way diminish the experience of enjoying some of the best writing on theatre and actresses you will ever encounter. Indeed, much of the social network material turns out to have been background notes and show business digressions that didn’t make it into the book. The project began more than 30 years ago when Grissom wrote a letter to the playwright and was invited to join Williams in New Orleans and then given an assignment to convey the writer’s gratitude to the great performers such as Maureen Stapleton, Jessica Tandy and Katharine Hepburn who helped him create many of his most indelible characters. Grissom wrote down everything Williams said to him during those few days in 1982, and then was stunned by the writer’s death the following year. The project was put

aside for a while, as Grissom moved from Baton Rouge to New York and held down a variety of jobs. He had reams of comments that Williams wanted him to convey to "the women of the fog" but it took him many years to do the interviews and then construct a book which is part biography, part memoir and part actress profiles. Judging by the intimacy and depth of the interview material, Grissom established immediate trust in the actresses Williams sent him to. And as word got out about the project, other major figures, such as Marlon Brando, reached out to Grissom and spoke frankly about acting, Williams, the Actors Studio and many other theatre topics with remarkable candor.

James Grissom devoted years of his life to the legacy of Tennessee Williams and has produced a work, the caliber of which Williams deserves. Here is the playwright in moments of audacity, insecurity, self-awareness, and despair; yet always seemingly within arms' reach of the women who could nourish him with the strength and courage to continue his work when the rest of the world had turned its back on him. In his later years, after tremendous success and accolades, Williams was emotionally tortured by the thought that possibly he'd be forgotten and that his plays would no longer matter. His best works were behind him and he wanted to know that he had mattered particularly he wanted to know that he mattered to the women who'd been his emotional touchstones as he created his female figures. Grissom became Williams' recruit -- the young man whose assignment it was to contact the people

who'd meant so much to Williams and his work and to present to them with Williams' own thoughts about them and their influence and then to record their reactions. Grissom does a fine job of not sugarcoating anything -- the ladies, the men who helped/influenced Williams or Williams himself as he allows the reader to know that Williams was drinking and using drugs during their conversations and Grissom's note-taking sessions. A very important book for anyone who wants to know about Williams and his plays. Overall this book provides the clearest path to understanding how Williams created, wrote and why he wrote.
